MINISTER'S MESSAGE

What Should We Do in These Uncertain Times?

What should we do now? Today's world has gone crazy. The Covid-19 pandemic has killed over 610,000 people, and new cases are increasing day by day in the U.S. and other countries. Countless people have lost jobs. Schools and churches are closed. Restaurants, shops, and stores are not yet opened.

George Floyd's death has unleashed a call for justice and an end to racism. It has brought peaceful protests to support Black Lives Matter, and it has brought violence, anxiety, distrust, fighting, looting, and sleepless nights.

Covid-19 and George Floyd's death have created suffering as we face many issues. They have also created the question before us, "what should we do now?"

We have "Happiness and Unhappiness" in our lives. I have no doubt that most of us want a "Happy Life." I do not think anyone wishes for an "Unhappy Life." We are always seeking a comfortable, easy, painless, conflict-free, and peaceful life. However, our life does not go the way we want due to changing conditions and impermanence. Happiness and unhappiness are also impermanent. This is a universal truth. To lessen the stress in our life today, we need to accept everything as they are, both moments of happiness and moments of unhappiness.

So I ask you again, "what should we do now in these uncertain times?" As your minister, my answer is: we should protect our life and the lives of our family members. Wear a face mask. Wash and keep our masks clean. Wash our hands frequently. Stay at home if we feel sick. Sanitize our hands after shopping. Take a shower twice a day, especially after going out. Use our online communication skills.

And "what should we do as Jodo Shin Buddhists for now?" Stand against racial discrimination. Live the Buddhist truth of interdependence and compassion. Just say "arigato" and "Namoamidabutsu" in gratitude for all the blessings we have received. Do it frequently in our everyday life and keep smiling!

Please take care yourself and be safe! Jikoen is always with you as your second home! Gassho.

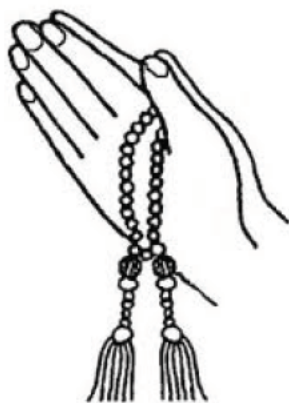

For 28 years – from 1989 to 2017 – Rose served as Administrator of Project Dana.

From 2002 to 2018 when I was Jikoen Hongwanji's Site Coordinator for Project Dana, I always found Rose to be consistently available when I needed her counsel. She was well-informed about the operations of the Jikoen Site. She was quick to pass on compliments of our volunteers and if monies were intended for Jikoen, she promptly forwarded them to us. Rose was always available to recognize Jikoen's volunteers when we had ceremonies to honor and thank them. She was an outstanding administrator.

Rose was recognized in year 2000 as a Living Treasure of Hawaii by the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii.



PPP and City & County Grants

During the early stages of the COVID-19 shutdown, the federal government enacted the Paycheck Protection Program ("PPP") to help small businesses affected by the shutdown to help with maintaining the salaries and wages of its employees. Did you know that Jikoen Hongwanji's Lumbini Preschool is a "small business?" Through the assistance of Derrick Inouye of Headquarters and our CPAs, Doris Oshiro, John Toguchi, June Nakamasu and Wayne Toma, prepared Jikoen's application for a grant/loan of \$91,300. Our Preschool had been closed and, with Reverend Nishiyama and Suzue Nishiyama's efforts and guidance, reopened for children of "essential persons." We started with 8 children and, later, 15. The grant/loan was very helpful in keeping our Preschool open.

We expect that this loan will be converted into a grant as most of our expenditures are payroll-related, the intent of this federal program.

The City and County of Honolulu was provided with a grant from the U.S. Small Business Administration. The grant application process was very hectic and Doris, June and Wayne submitted a timely application. Jikoen received \$5,300.

The receipt of these monies was very timely and enabled Jikoen to continue serving families with timely and safe child care.

COMMUNITY CORNER

Library's Been Closed But You Can Still Borrow a Book

If you were a regular visitor to the Library who borrowed books, you must have been suffering with no books to read. Even though the libraries are closed, you can still borrow a book. How, you ask? You become an eBook subscriber. You read the eBook on your Smartphone, tablet, or iPad. I recommend your Smartphone.

Here's the process. On your phone, click your web browser (Safari, Chrome) for the Hawaii State Library System. On the website, scroll for the "Overdrive" app. Download this app to your phone. Needed: your Library card number and PIN. After the download, click your Apps or Play Store icon and do a search for "Libby." It will ask for your library system. Scroll for Hawaii State Library System. Again, enter your Library card number and PIN. With Overdrive and Libby on your phone (or iPad or Tablet), you're ready to borrow an eBook. Click "Libby," then click "Library" at the bottom left to visit the State Library System. Click on Search (the magnifying glass), enter your favorite author or book title and the eBook titles are displayed. Some eBooks can be borrowed immediately. Others may have a "hold" period. Unlike the hardcovers with many copies, the number of eBooks is limited. You want a best-seller? The wait may be 6 months! You can place up to 15 holds so the wait for one of your selections should be reasonable.

It'll take a while to get comfortable with this new approach to borrowing and reading books. Don't be discouraged. You will find that reading an eBook on your Smartphone is so convenient — no heavy book to carry while lying in bed plus you can read the eBook anywhere. Of course, not during Sangha Service.

She was the co-founder of Project Dana and served as the Founding Administrator from 1989 to 2017, an Honorary Advisor of HHMH, a former President of Hawaii Federation of BWA, a former President of Moiliili Hongwanji Mission, and a President of Moiliili Hongwanji BWA.

The Hawaii Kyodan Funeral Service is currently being coordinated by the Office of the Bishop and Moiliili Hongwanji Mission. Due to the current situation of COVID-19, an invitation will be extended only to immediate family members.

The family is planning to hold a public ceremony after the current situation with the Pandemic improves. We will share more information at a later date.
