Jikoen Members Restored by Restored Land and Community at Ho'oulu 'Āina, Kalihi Valley Nature Park

Nine folks connected to Jikoen enjoyed a huaka'i, or journey, to an oasis in the back of Kālihi Valley as part of an initiative by Honolulu Hongwanji Council Social Concerns Committee to organize such community trips for local enrichment and community building. Ho'oulu 'Āina is best described on its website as "a 100-acre nature preserve nestled in the back of Kalihi Valley. Here the community comes together around forest, food, knowledge, spirituality, and health activity. As we restore this land to productivity, giving back the values of our ancestors, we learn that healing is reciprocal." While it is a wetlands preserve, it is accurately referred to as a health center — physically, mentally and spiritually, where the healing comes from relationships with the land and each other.

While the community center is grounded in Kānaka Maoli (Native Hawaiian) culture and wisdom, it also spoke from the language of our ancestors. "Nuchi Gusui" is an Uchinānchu proverb meaning "food is medicine," that is central at this site of restoring land, forest — and people. Ho'oulu 'Āina has been a place where locals come to help tend the land, and receive healing fellowship, food and herbs nurtured here. Attendees from four east O'ahu temples were treated to healthy 'ono foods and teas, as well as reconnected through the humorous talkstory of the hosts led by Puni Jackson, director of Ho'oulu 'Āina.

On one "walkstory" as Hoʻoulu 'Āina calls it, attendees strolled through gardens of which stories of 'āina evoked connections that transcended culture, time and geography, Puni's husband KC was asked if part of restoration included eradicating invasive species that have crowded out native species from surviving. After reflecting on the question, KC shifted question from destroying invasive foliage like chemotherapy to a Kānaka Maoli perspective of managing invasive plants through utilizing them for their gifts. He shared with us many examples of how they have utilized felled Albizia trees that have been extremely damaging to Hawaiian ecosystems, such as crafting into native canoes in the tradition of Hawaiian and Micronesian shaped by local youth as a part of heathy community activities.

Such stories inspire how we settlers to these environmentally fragile islands can live in a more mindful manner that sustains healthy environmental and cultural balance for future generations as inspired by ancestral wisdom. We are so blessed to have such a gem in the ahupua'a land division of Jikoen. Please see their website www.hoouluaina.org for opportunities to volunteer or learn more about such soul-feeding efforts right in our community.

HILITES FROM HQ NEWS UPDATES (*November*, 2022)

Season of appreciation and gratitude!

As we approach the Holiday Season including the Thanksgiving Holiday, and also in the Eitaikyo Season with Bodhi Day upon us, one word that comes immediately to mind is gratitude. Due to Sakyamuni Buddha and the commitment and dedication of past Sangha members, we gratefully have our temples where we are able to receive the Dharma especially hear the Compassionate call of Amida Buddha who promises "Vowing not to attain Buddhahood if they are not born." Amida Buddha is saying that unless, you and I, are not born in the Pure Land, then, I (Amida Buddha) have not attained perfect enlightenment. "Wow!"

Recently, I attended the 61st Nuuanu Valley Interfaith Thanksgiving Service, the longest running interfaith service in Hawaii, held every year prior to Thanksgiving to express gratitude and each year a worthy community organization or entity which benefits the community

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is highlighted with donations collected given to it. As I sat there I remembered the teaching that encourages us "some of it (our earnings) must be shared with others, some of it must be saved for an emergency, some of it must be set aside for the needs of the community, and some of it must be devoted to the needs of religious teachers."

Reflecting, again, the next day, a verse from one of Shinran Shonin's poems came to mind "Casting off the pain of birth-and-death since the beginningless past, We are certain of attaining supreme nirvana. This is through Amida's directing of virtue for going forth and returning; Our gratitude for the Buddha's benevolence is truly hard to fulfill." In our Jodo Shinshu Teachings, the credit goes to Amida Buddha for our being able to go to the Pure Land and also (after having attained enlightenment) our return from the Pure Land to help others also realize the same joy, peace and happiness. Amida Buddha is the reason for our "going" to and our "returning" from the Pure Land of Enlightenment. Such is Amida Buddha's Great Compassion which will not stop until, one and all, are like Amida Buddha, completely enlightened to the point that Amida Buddha promises (as noted earlier) "Vowing not to attain (perfect) Buddhahood if they (people) are not born (in the Pure Land)." Truly as Shinran Shonin said, "Our gratitude for the Buddha's benevolence is truly hard to fulfill."

Yes, indeed, how immense is Amida Buddha's compassion and how grateful I am for it! However, when one deeply reflects one comes to understand that the overwhelming gratitude I experience is not from me, but arises because of Amida Buddha. It is Amida Buddha's pure, sincere and compassionate actions which makes gratitude arise in me. In this sense, it is not "my" gratitude and I find myself responding to that gratitude by living a life of Nembutsu imbued with gratitude.

We have so much to be grateful for including our temples. In the midst of this season of thanksgiving and gratitude, let us remember the expression "Knowing gratitude, Respond in gratitude." Let us be guided by the (Buddhist) teaching of "The wise show appreciation not only to the person(s) who helped (them) by returning some act of kindness, but to all those around them." Namo Amida Butsu.




