YBICSE Is Back!!

The YBICSE (Young Buddhist International Cultural Exchange) which will be held on July 2-12, 2024.

YBICSE is a Hongwanji-sponsored educational trip to Japan. Participants will join others from the US Mainland, Canada, South America, and Japan to learn and experience Japanese culture. This is a special opportunity for Hawaii Buddhists to make and share Nembutsu Moments.

Applicants must be current 9th graders to age 25. They should be interested in and appreciate Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, be in good health, and must have a valid passport by May 31, 2024. Seven (7) delegates will be selected in May.

The registration fee for 2024 YBICSE is \$2,400. This includes travel from Honolulu International Airport to Japan but does not include inter-island travel to HNL. Personal spending money and some meals are not covered.

In addition to this online application form, you need to submit your profile, and reference from your resident minister and your temple member. All application materials must be received by May 7, 2024. Incomplete applications beginning May 8 will not be considered.

Hongwanji Hosts Interfaith Community Town Hall & Iftar Dinner

Hawai'i Betsuin hosted a soulful interfaith community gathering of conscience and compassion-in-action in conjunction with the ACLU Hawai'i, a premier defender of civil rights, over dialog and Iftar dinner, a traditional meal partaken by Muslims at sundown to break their daily fast during their reflective season of Ramadan on April

2, 2024. Considering the place religion holds in violence around the world, it was inspiring to see different families of faith, including Buddhists, Christians, Jews, and Muslims fellowship together for peace and social justice within the context of each religion. A resounding theme across faiths and ethnicities was the dignity of each life and the collective aspiration for the ceasefire of war in Palestine out of our shared humanity.

Interconnectedness

Buddhism teaches us that we are all interconnected. This truth was made evident to us throughout the very busy month of April.

- On April 6th, the Buddhist Study Center invited Jikoen to have a booth at their Spring Festival. Our participation, along with that of many other Hongwanji temples, gave us opportunities to renew connections with many Oahu members.
- On April 13th, our Jikoen bazaar gave us physical evidence of interconnectedness as people dropped off donations. Some volunteers spent the week setting up displays of the items while others prepared food items for sale.
- On April 14th, Dr. Jon Matsuoka of Hawaii Betsuin was the guest speaker at our Hanamatsuri service.
- On April 21st, Our Eshinni and Kakushinni Day speaker was Joanne Kealoha, President of Moiliili Hongwanji.
- On April 28th, the Jr. YBA students of Honolulu led our service and shared information about their organization. They were supported by their advisor, Joy Nishida, of Windward Buddhist Temple.

When we recognize the generous support and aloha from so many we are filled with gratitude and can only say, "Namo Amida Butsu."

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

Our guest speaker, Dr. Jon Matsuoka, used the occasion to speak about how the Hongwanji in Hawaii needs to experience a rebirth. He was direct in outlining what we must do now if the Hongwanji is to continue beyond the next ten years. He explained in clear terms that we need to open our doors to other groups who can find comfort in our teachings; that we need to apply our teachings to the real world through social action and community development. He concluded his inspiring talk by pointing out that our Buddhist teachings resonate with two groups and that we should consider reaching out to them. One group is the LBBTQ community and the other the Native Hawaiian community. Dr. Matsuoka offered sobering ideas for all who think about the future of Hongwanji in Hawaii.

BWA Selects Convention Theme

The Hawaii Federation of Buddhist Women's Associations has selected "Live Peace! Live Aloha! Live as One in the Nembutsu" as the theme for the 18th World Buddhist Women's Convention. Hawaii will host the convention at the Hawaii Convention Center September 11th – 12th, 2027.

The HFBWA will be welcoming about 2,000 to 2,500 BWA members from Japan, the Buddhist Churches of America, the Jodo Shinshu Buddhist Temples of Canada, and the Buddhist Churches of South America.

Although the convention is three years away, the steering committee and the entertainment committee have already begun planning. An event of this scope and size will require many minds and hands, so there will be plenty of opportunities to volunteer as things progress.

HILITES FROM HQ NEWS UPDATES (April, 2024)

Message From the Bishop

Eight months have passed since the Maui Wildfire devastated many houses and buildings and displaced thousands of people. We would like to express our appreciation to the ministers, members, and many people from within and outside the Hongwanji Community for your heartwarming words and compassionate actions for those affected by the Maui Wildfire. We would like to provide some updated reports of our emergency responses and recovery actions as Hawaii Kyodan.

As of March 29, 2024, HHMH has received \$872,292.86 in cash/check donations. Through the Committee on Social Concerns, we have processed omimai for each member of Lahaina Hongwanji and other individuals of our Hawaii Kyodan Ohana who have been impacted by the wildfires. We have also donated to various non-profit organizations to support their emergency relief efforts. As the needs of the Lahaina Hongwanji Mission, its members, and the West Maui community arise, we will continue to provide support to facilitate the healing process. We are also assessing the significant funding requirements to reestablish the Temple as an integral part of the Lahaina community.

Many temples and individuals in Japan have extended their support directly to HHMH or through Honzan's fundraising campaign. The Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha, our headquarters in Kyoto, and its affiliated organizations have also contributed over \$240,000. Bishop Umitani attended the Shukai (Legislative Assembly) at Honzan on February 29, 2024, to make a presentation on the Maui Wildfires and officially express our appreciation for their ongoing support.

FEMA's site visit to Lahaina Hongwanji was held on March 11 and 12, 2024. The purpose of the visit was to enable FEMA to develop an estimate of reconstruction costs for lost structures. During the inspection, our team also met with FEMA Hazard Mitigation, Historical Preservation, & HIEMA. Rev. Hironaka, Derrick Inouye, Gary Murai, and several Lahaina Hongwanji Members represented the HHMH. The Maui County Right of Entry has been approved and the date for the Corps of Engineers to handle the debris cleanup has not yet been set.

As the scope of the Maui Wildfire Emergency Response Ad-Hoc Committee has shifted from emergency response to recovery/rebuilding, the Committee was disbanded on April 1, 2024, and the Lahaina Hongwanji Recovery and Rebuilding Committee was newly organized, chaired by Michael Munekiyo. The new Committee will focus on recovery-related coordination requirements with FEMA, the Corps of Engineers, and other State and County agencies. As well, the Committee will support the Lahaina Hongwanji Sangha in the various planning processes associated with the Temple reestablishment goal.

As fellow travelers of the Nembutsu, may we continue to stand in solidarity with those experiencing suffering and sorrow caused by this unprecedented disaster.

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2022); "As people of Japan, the only nation that has been hit by atomic bombs, as Buddhists who cherish every life, and as Nembutsu followers who aspire for peace across the world, we condemn this aggression by disapproving the self-righteous excuses made by the authoritarian government. As learning from human history, we wish for this war to end at once." Sadly, we must restate this passage once again as another armed conflict now takes place.

Triggered by Hamas' October 7, 2023 missile attack, the warfare between Israel and Hamas has brought about a hellish situation to the Gaza Strip. A devastating attack by Israeli military of a hospital in Gaza City has stood out as an outrageous example of warfare's cruelty and unlawfulness. This is a battle between armed forces who uses unarmed civilians as their human shield and the world's leading powerful military who doesn't mind victimizing those people. Lost in such battle are civilians' lives, many of whom are women and children. As of November 11, it was reported that eleven thousand people have been killed, of which more than 40 percent or 4,506 were children. During a November 6 interview, UN Secretary-General, Antonio Guterres described the situation saying "Gaza is becoming a graveyard for children" and hearing so has struck our hearts greatly.

Shinran, the founder of the Jodo Shinshu teaching had also lived during a warring age in which many people suffered. Identifying himself as one [of] them, he described the most marginalized people as "they are... none other than we, who are like stones and tiles and pebbles." Shinran never wished for his own happiness only, and in reference to himself and others as "we," represents his deep feeling of bond with all humanity tied together through the Nembutsu teaching. It is a matter of course, that we would like to have his teaching as the basis of our lives, but it is also necessary for us to learn from his way of living.

As the saying goes, "Nobody wins a war." In the first of the Forty-eight Vows that says "there should not be

hell, the realm of hungry spirits, or the realm of animals in my land," Amida Tathagata pledged to guide us to a world that is free from suffering. As Nembutsu followers who have encountered this Buddha's wish, we naturally come to aspire for a world in which everyone can live in peace and harmony. In accord with the Buddha's vow, in consideration of those who have been suffering from this battle, we call for immediate ceasefire and an end to war.

BCA National Council Meeting

February 23 and 24, 2024 at the Buddhist Church of Sacramento

"Embracing the Dharma with Hope and Joy"

Derrick Inouye, Warren Tamamoto and Claire Tamamoto attended the Buddhist Churches of America National Council Meeting (BCA NCM) on February 23-25 at the Buddhist Church of Sacramento. The BCA NCM is the annual business meeting for the BCA, similar to our own Legislative Assembly. (shortened for space)

John Arima, Chair of the Vision and Strategic Planning Committee reported that the committee is working to update BCA's mission and vision statements. A poll was taken during the BCA NCM to better understand BCA stakeholders' shared vision and values.

Glenn Inanaga, BCA President-elect gave a very interesting presentation titled "The Right Time is Now: Preparing Temple Leaders for Today's Challenges." The presentation discussed broad challenges that temples and the BCA face including declining membership, minister shortages, social media exposure, temple affiliated partnerships and financial sustainability. Glenn reminded us that on average the U.S. consumer pays \$500 to \$1000 per year for Netflix and similar subscription services (Netflix vs.

The Nembutsu). Temples are like Netflix. Subscribers don't switch from Netflix to Hulu because it is cheaper. The key is content and community. Even now, members will pay for value. They don't stay for cost savings. Glenn challenged the assembly, "How do we create, highlight, and invest in content and community?"

Terri Omori, BCA President reported for the Bishop Selection Committee. The committee interviewed Bishop Marvin Harada and selected Bishop Harada for his second four-year term. The motion to ratify a second term (at the BCA NCM) for Bishop Harada was carried unanimously. Bishop Harada shared his goals for the BCA: increase membership, support the Dharma Forward campaign and fully staff all of the temples. Terri Omori, by the way, is the first woman President of the Buddhist Churches of America. She received a standing ovation from the assembly for her work over the past 2 years. Steven Terusaki was installed as the new President of the BCA. (shortened for space)

Rev. Kiyonobu Kuwahara reported on the activities of the Jodo Shinshu International Office. JSIO's goals are to develop programs and publications that share Jodo Shinshu teachings with the world. Please go to their website (jsinternational.org) for more information as they are working very hard to accomplish their goals.

I am able to share just a few of the highlights of the conference. Both days were filled with excellent presentations and discussion. The atmosphere was warm, and I felt a spirit of Aloha at the conference. The members of the Buddhist Church of Sacramento (with help from other Northern California District temple members) hosted the entire conference. Meetings, services, and meals were held in the gymnasium/multi-purpose room. The food was cooked by NoCal volunteers and the udon, teriyaki sandwiches, noodles and many other dishes were "ono." And we were treated to a fantastic prime rib dinner banquet at the close of the conference on Saturday.

We are grateful to the BCA Sangha for hosting us for three wonderful days! Aloha and Mahalo nui loa!
