MINISTER'S MESSAGE Rev. Shindo Nishiyama

Hongwanji Day

On March 3, we will be observing Hongwanji Day. Do you know how many years it has been since the Hongwanji began its ministry in Hawaii?

Since Prince Shotoku established Buddhism in Japan over 1400 years ago, many people have depended on the Buddha's Teaching in their daily lives. Shinran Shonin, who was born in 1173, was one who would embrace the Nembutsu Teachings and eventually establish the foundation of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism.

627 years after Shinran Shonin passed away, one of the young Jodo Shinshu followers, Rev. Soryu Kagahi, left Japan for Hawaii to drop the seeds of the Nembutsu among Japanese immigrants to provide them with a spiritual life in joy and gratitude with the Buddha Dharma. On March 3, 1889, in the evening, the first Jodo Shinshu service was held with offering of incense, ringing of the bell, and chanting of the sutra at Kojima Hotel on Beretania Street. The true, sincere, and universal Nembutsu Teaching landed here in Hawaii from Japan 130 years ago.

During the Hongwanji Day Service, we gather to express our sincere appreciation to the founder of Buddhism, Shakyamuni Buddha, masters in China and Japan, Master Honen, our founder, Shinran Shonin, his wife, Eshinni, as well as to many Jodo Shinshu ministers and lay members in Japan and here in Hawaii, Rev. Soryu Kagahi, Issei pioneers, Nisei, and all dedicated ministers and members of Honpa Hongwanji in Hawaii. *Okagesamade*, because of all of them as well as the current ministers and members, we are able to enjoy the teaching of universal unconditional love and great wisdom here at Jikoen today.

Jikoen had a reason to begin our Sangha. There was the great need for spiritual support for these isolated Okinawan immigrants who had very little background in Buddhist Teachings. Later, Jikoen was established with a core group of those who were committed to building a place for Okinawans to receive further spiritual guidance in Jodo Shin teaching and for a place of gathering to support each other and perpetuate Uchinanchu culture. I am grateful for all the religious leaders and mentors who came before us.

Personally, I have another mentor I am grateful for on this

Hongwanji Day. My mother was born into a minister's family and married my father in 1946 right after the war. They established a childcare center for those who lost their parents in Omuta City's large air raid during the war in 1945. I was told by my parents that there were many homeless children dying due to lack of food and proper welfare facilities because of the destruction after the war. They decided to rescue those children by opening the temple and caring for them. This was the beginning of Shirasagi Preschool at my home temple in Fukuoka, Japan. They established the foundation of the preschool shortly after the war ended. They were committed to providing childcare to protect those children's lives and to help them with spiritual development through the teachings of Buddha. My mother used to tell me that there were all kinds of children. Some were runaways, some were always trying to start fights or steal money from the temple, but she always told them the same thing: the Buddha's unconditional compassion is never judgmental, it embraces everyone without discrimination, and everyone is truly equal in the Buddha Dharma.

Whenever I face problems at our preschool, I try to recall my late mother's words. Today, I am a minister of Jikoen and the principal of its preschool. I thank my Mom for the spiritual lessons and guidance she has provided me to carry out the responsibilities I now hold at Jikoen.

At Jikoen preschool, we have all kinds of children and parents. Sometimes we have problems but I am grateful that I am charged with the care of these very precious children by protecting their lives and developing their educational skills. My late mother told me, "every child is equal and precious," and so I must keep remembering her advice and guidance as I commit my responsibility to our preschool. I cherish my mother's words as a precious gift.

Gautama Shiddalta had reasons for leaving his palace when he was young. He wanted to seek the path of awakening beyond human suffering to become an awakened one who can live his life as it truly is. The Dharma wheel began to roll when Shakyamuni Buddha was enlightened under the Bodhi tree. The Buddha Dharma wheel is rolling and never stops because the Buddha's teaching is true, sincere, and universal.

On this Hongwanji Day, let us remember and reflect upon all the religious leaders, mentors and pioneers who established our spiritual place. Starting with Shakamuni Buddha, the Masters in China, Prince Shotoku, Honen Shonin, Shinran Shonin, Eshinni, Rev. Kagahi, the core group of Jikoen, and for our parents, and grandparents

those who dedicated the Jikoen Ohana with a strong commitment to keep this temple for us.

On this Hongwanji Day, we come to realize that the Nembutsu teaching is rolling every day, every moment in the presence of Amida Buddha's Wisdom and great Compassion. We receive the Buddha's benevolence and we are embraced by Amida Buddha's unconditional and non-judgmental mind. We just recite the Nembutsu as an expression of gratitude, not as an offering or prayer to Amida Buddha. The Nembutsu is given by Amida Buddha for each of us to be aware that our whole life is already saved, in the name, Namo Amida Butsu.

Project Dana is a Faith In Action program that provides a variety of services to the frail, elderly, and disabled to ensure their well-being, independence, and dignity in an environment of their choice. Started in 1989 at Moiliili Hongwanji, the initiative is now hosted by over thirty churches and temples across Hawaii and the U.S. mainland.

Trained volunteers provide support, guided by the principle of "Dana," which combines selfless giving and compassion without desire for recognition or reward. Project Dana also collaborates with over 150 private and public agencies across the state.

A typical Project Dana assignment is providing transportation to a nearby market every two weeks. A variation of this is "shopping by list" for those unable to shop on their own. Other assignments could entail housework or to provide transportation for a doctor's appointment.


